News from the IB Coordinator, Malene Sørensen



Dear current and upcoming students, parents and other stakeholders

School merger

Education is a broad concept and most of us associate immediately the idea of education with attending school one way or another. This phrase with the emphasis on "... or another", I can assure you, is to a great extent true for the IB students graduating this summer. The school has been undergoing turbulent times during the preceding year with the merger of Langkaer Gymnasium and AARHUS TECH, and as exciting as it is taking part in building up a new school based on the best of both schools, certain teething troubles like change of ITsystems and 'schedule bantering' have required patient and flexible students. Although these skills will not appear on the final diploma, I hope that these attributes of adaptability will be a strength for our students in the future.

New IB Coordinator

In the middle of the school year there has also been a change of the IB Coordinator, so the students and the teachers have had to become accustomed to that too. I have been the new IB Coordinator at Aarhus Gymnasium, Tilst since January 1st. Once upon a time I graduated from Aarhus University, and since then I have been working in education and management professions. I have been involved in the IB School system several years, and I am an experienced IB history teacher. I find my new school exciting with budding initiatives, experienced and highly skilled IB teachers and a bunch of creative, humorous and forthcoming students that, so far, mostly know me as the dragon guarding deadlines.

Altogether a lot of changes and challenges for the IB students!!

... And it did not stop there. In March we realized that the International Baccalaureate exams set for May have been cancelled due to the corona virus pandemic. The big question has been how the IB organization then will determine the students' final grades. The answer is that the IB will use a calculation that is based on the relationship between coursework marks, predicted grades and subject grades to estimate the subject grades candidates would have received if the exams had gone ahead.

Details about assessment

The IB has required schools to submit the coursework for all candidates instead of taking samples and applying moderation - and then they will externally mark work that is usually marked by teachers. This means that the students' grades will be assessed on predicted grades awarded by the teachers based on all the work our students have done in the subjects as well as based on a prediction of how they would have done at the exams (the teachers include class performance, general written work, mocks, in class tests etc.). In addition, the IB has the IAs and externally assessed coursework and they will look at data from previous years, both globally and from the school. In the IB's own words, they "will be undertaking significant data analysis from previous exam sessions, individual school data, subject data as well as comparative data of schools".

And in the time of writing I still cannot confirm the date of the 3i graduation ceremony. Indeed, an unpredictable school year in every manner possible. *Take care everyone.*



Group 4 project

The group 4 project is an interdisciplinary activity in which all IB DP science students must participate. The intention is that students from the different group 4 subjects analyze a common topic or problem. The exercise should be a collaborative experience where the emphasis is on the processes involved in, rather than the products of, such an activity.

For my group, the group 4 project was a process largely focused on observation. This comes mainly through the nature of our experiment, being the effect of heat on the respiration and activity levels of mealworms, being an experiment that neither our teachers nor we had any idea what to expect as an outcome.

Therefore, we had to spend a large amount of time in discussion before we could begin the experiment, and after the experiment, we had to do a rigorous amount of analysis on the data we had observed.

For the presentation, it was quite interesting how curious others were about the experiment, and we spent a lot of time on open discussion about the nature of the mealworms' movement patterns.

As a whole the group 4 project was a very informative experience, that gave us the chance to better understand how to use the scientific method in our research.


